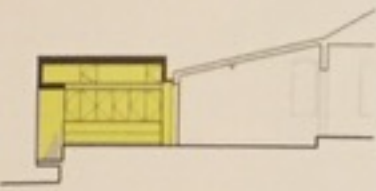
You could call this a new site, or even a new platform or framework, which gives a different perspective or reinforces the old one.

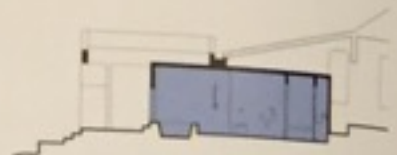

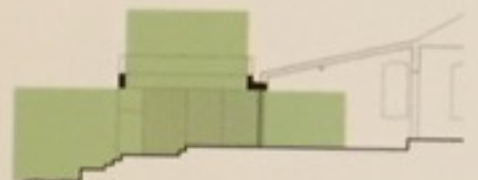
Floor plan of terrace alterations and additions

Section through bathroom



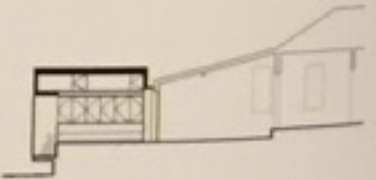
Section through pathway

West elevation

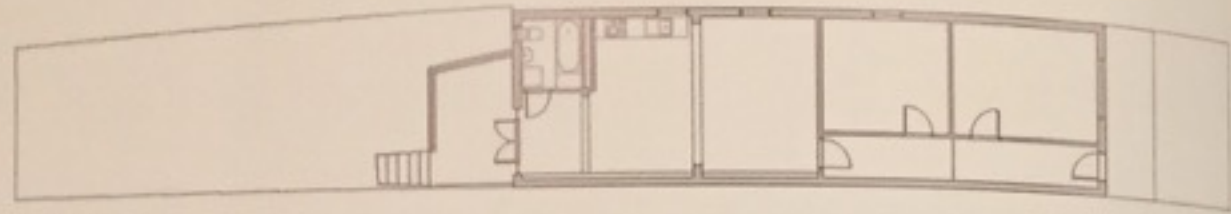


Longitudinal section

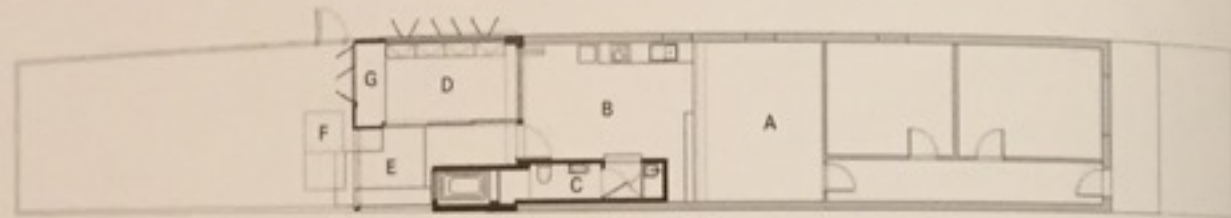

Perspective drawing of new enclosed terrace

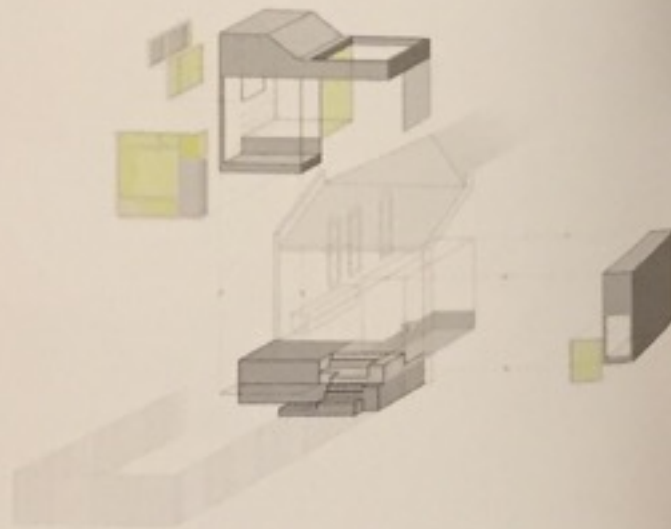


Diagram of terrace alterations and additions
